





SIGHTINGS HIGHLIGHTS FROM 2020

- 38 humpback whale records! All records, bar one, were recorded between November and December from around the very West coast of Cornwall and the Isle of Scilly.
- A phenomenal 971 common dolphin records!
- 2020 saw the return of the basking shark with a wonderful 18 sightings mostly around the Lizard and Lands End.
- The second largest mammal in the world, the **fin whale**, was recorded 9 times in 2020.
- Bluefin tuna have made a tremendous return to Cornish waters with **250** records of these apex predators.
- White-beaked dolphins made another yearly visit to our waters with 3 more records all in Falmouth Bay.
- St Ives Christmas public Seaquest watch, 5 species in 2 hours including a fin whale!


