





• On the 5th May the famous pair of orca, John Coe and Aquarius made an appearance off the Lizard coast in front of the Minack Theatre.

On the 17th June an unusual visitor turned up on the Isles of Scilly. The walrus fondly named Wally stayed on St Mary's for over 6 weeks before continuing on his journey, hopefully back to his home in the arctic circle.

A record breaking **118 minke whale** sightings seen throughout the year!!


A whopping **56 basking shark** records **50** of those recorded in April.

21 humpback whale records and **12 fin whales** records.

Both common dolphin and harbour porpoise have been seen and recorded all year around the Cornish coast.
